

Since our last annual report, we are delighted to report The District and all schools met academic standards on state-mandated assessments. In 2018, student achievement increased in several content areas, and in most grade levels. But perhaps most impressive was the continued and dramatic improvement realized by our English Learner and Special Education (SPED) students! English Learners scored the best in the "Meets Grade Level" category in every content area and grade level on the STAAR and End Of Course exams in the El Paso region, while SPED students hit this mark in all but one grade level. It is not surprising, therefore, that we are making a name for ourselves as a school district that has "cracked the code." We have set up a successful blueprint and instructional framework that works, thanks in no small part to the persistent efforts of administration and teachers within the four corners of the classroom.

Notwithstanding, state standardized assessments are only one measure of our effectiveness as a school system. Another arguably more important measure is one that focuses on program and performance indicators. Programs and courses to increase performance on PSAT, TSI, SAT, and AP examinations are thriving at all of our middle schools and high schools. More than ever before, our eighth-grade students are enrolling and successfully completing Algebra I – a strong indicator of college readiness. Dual-credit program enrollment continues to increase, demonstrating another facet of our commitment to college readiness.

Fiscally, the district's fund balance grew to \$99 million at the close of the 2017-18 school year. This was accomplished after giving employees a modest increase in compensation during each of the past five years, including a one-time \$450 payment for the second consecutive year during the holiday season. This collaboration between labor and management has improved relationships across the district, resulting in better performance on behalf of the 41,000 students we serve.

The District has also proceeded exactly as we pledged during the YISD Bond 2015 campaign. Our new school designs not only support the academic goals of educators, but push the boundaries of K-12 architecture. Our newest schools feature flexible learning spaces, enhanced technology, environmentally friendly features, and colocation, to the delight of our students, staff, parents, and community. In a mere three years, we have renovated, upgraded, expanded, or constructed new schools in every learning community. In 2018, we celebrated the opening of the new Bel Air Middle School, and the Thomas Manor Elementary School. We are also nearing completion on four major projects: the extensive renovation of our most populous Eastwood High School; and the construction of a K-8 combination Mission Valley Elementary/Del Valle Middle School, the Bel Air High School Sports Complex, and the Ysleta High School Fine Arts Center.

We have set an ambitious path for ourselves and for our students, and we intend to stay the course. As Superintendent of Schools, I thank you for taking the time to review our annual report and learn more about the innovative, transformative, and creative initiatives happening in our district.



ACCOUNTABILITY

The 103-year-old Ysleta Independent School District is the third-largest school district in El Paso, serving more than 41,000 students in a diverse, family-friendly, and tight-knit community. In 2018, the vast majority of YISD schools successfully increased student achievement in both content areas and grade levels on the state's STAAR tests and End Of Course (EOC) exams. The best results, however, were seen among Special Education and English Language Learner (ELL) students, who outperformed their peers in comparable programs in the region. In particular, YISD saw the highest percentages of ELL students who approached, met, or mastered grade-level skills on the STAAR or EOC in nearly every grade level and content area.





As part of the state's new A-F accountability system, all Exas districts and charter districts were given letter grades in 2018 to reflect how well they are doing in three areas: Student Achievement, Student Progress, and Closing The Gaps.

- Student Achievement: Measures how well students know and can apply their grade-level knowledge and skills, based on factors such as state test results, Advanced Placement and ACT results, and graduation rates
- School Progress: Measures year-to-year student improvement on the STAAR test and how this improvement compares to schools with similar demographics
- Closing the Gaps: Looks at performance among student groups, including racial/ethnic groups, socioeconomic backgrounds, etc.


Overall, Ysleta ISD was among 45% of Texas school districts to receive a letter grade of B for recognized performance. This means YISD serves many students well by encouraging high academic achievement and appropriate academic growth. In addition, all YISD schools received a state rating of "Met Standard."





OUR ACADEMIC PERFORMANCE


2018 STAAR: PERCENT RATED "MEETS GRADE LEVEL"

Since its founding in 1915, YISD has grown from a small, rural district to an innovative leader in local education, featuring 60 campuses in seven Learning Communities: Bel Air, Del Valle, Eastwood, Hanks, Parkland, Riverside, and Ysleta. Each Learning Community consists of its namesake high school and the elementary/middle schools that feed into it. We also offer specialty campuses, such as a college-preparatory academy for girls in grades 6-12; three international schools; and three early college high schools. Every year, YISD produces exceptional, competitive, and college-ready high school graduates — in fact, our Class of 2018 valedictorians achieved an average GPA of 103.6! Many students also realized triumphs far beyond the four corners of the classroom in 2018, earning local, state, and national recognition in athletics, fine arts, JROTC, and community service.





TOP OF THEIR CLASS

Three Eastwood High School seniors – Andrew Lowrance, Leonardo Moraveg, and Ryan James Solis – were among only 300 in the nation to win the first-ever Gates Scholarship from the Bill & Melinda Gates Foundation in 2018!

All three are now attending Ivy League schools and will have the full cost of their undergraduate studies covered at any accredited college or university of their choosing. This includes tuition, fees, room, board, books, and transportation, and possibly other personal costs that the school or other scholarships don't pay, over and above what the students' parents can afford to pay.

More than 28,000 students applied for the Gates Scholarship. This prestigious scholarship program is based on evidence that by eliminating the financial barriers to college, an all-expenses-paid scholarship can enable high-potential, low-income minority students to excel in their course work, graduate college, and continue to be leaders throughout their lives.

In 2018, our Junior Reserve Officer Training Corps (JROTC) program was hailed as one of the best in the country by the Department of the Army!

All seven of our high-school JROTC programs earned the highest inspection rating of Honor Unit with Distinction (HUD) – a rarity for a school district of our size. In fact, YISD is the only school district to have achieved this goal twice over two consecutive inspection cycles in its Army region, which stretches from Arkansas to the California border and north to Wyoming.

To achieve HUD status, a school must score 95% or above in every area: a cadet continuous improvement plan briefing, service learning project briefing, interview and portfolio; a uniform and cadet knowledge inspection; color guard presentation; physical fitness participation; community service record review; and more.

JROTC: Motivating Young People to be Better Citizens

JROTC is a character and leadership development program for high school students. It serves about 314,000 cadets at more than 1,700 U.S. high schools and is led by 4,000 retired Army Instructors.





12 YISD SCHOOLS RECOGNIZED AS LEADERS IN THE REGION

Twelve YISD schools were recognized in 2018 for being clear leaders in getting students to grade level and beyond when they were named to the Texas Honor Roll!

The 2017-18 Honor Roll schools were Eastwood Heights, Edgemere, Mesa Vista, North Star, Ramona, Scotsdale, Vista Hills, and Ysleta elementary schools; Alicia Chacon and Eastwood Knolls international schools; the Young Women's Leadership Academy; and Valle Verde Early College High School.

YISD had more Honor Roll schools in 2018 than any other district in the El Paso region, thanks to its focus on high academic achievement, student improvement over time, reducing achievement gaps, and college readiness.

The 2017-18 Texas Honor Roll was developed by Educational Results Partnership (ERP), a nonprofit organization that applies data science to help improve student outcomes and career readiness. Nearly 730 schools in the state were named Honor Roll schools, which share a common set of success factors that include:

- Clear, specific learning objectives aligned to college and career readiness, and evidence-based instructional practices
- A systemwide mission of college and career readiness for all students;
- Investment in human capital
- Maintenance of data/assessment systems to monitor school and student performance
- Using resources and guidance to support school efforts to prepare all students for college/career

All 12 YISD schools were recognized as Star Schools that have significant populations of socioeconomically disadvantaged students, but have shown a significant increase in grade-level proficiency over time.

TEA DISTINCTION DESIGNATIONS

Six YISD campuses proved to be among the state's bestperforming schools in 2018, earning every distinction available from the Texas Education Agency (TEA) for outstanding state test results! All YISD schools earned the state rating of "Met Standard," making them eligible to receive TEA Distinction Designations for achievement in the following seven areas:

Academic achievement in:

- English/reading
- Math

• Science

Social Studies

Placing in the top 25% in:

- Academic Growth
- Closing Performance Gaps
- Postsecondary Readiness

Earning all six distinctions available to primary grades were Vista Hills Elementary School and Ysleta Elementary School, while Alicia Chacon International School, Eastwood Knolls International School, Camino Real Middle School, and the Young Women's Leadership Academy earned all seven distinctions available to secondary grades.

Only about 400 campuses – or 4% of public schools in Texas – earned every distinction available to their school type in 2018. Distinction Designations are awarded based on achievement in certain areas when compared to campuses of similar type, size, and student demographics.



Ivan was flown to Washington D.C. in June 2018 for an awards ceremony and to watch the installation of "Glare" in the hallways of the U.S. Capitol, where it will be on display for one year. Ivan said his piece was inspired by a photo of his friend, which he sprayed with a water bottle: "I really like the concept

of making things shiny – a lot of people compliment me on my ability to make things look like they're wet."

In 2017, Ivan was among the top three finalists for the Congressional Art Award, but the award went to fellow schoolmate Emily Gonzalez. It made him even more determined to win in 2018, and he was beyond thrilled to learn Congressman O'Rourke had chosen his artwork.

Deion racked up 7,491 career rushing yards, making him one of the greatest running backs in city history and leading to the Matadors' bi-district championship and District 1-5A Division

Overall, Deion's career stats at Parkland High School have been just as impressive, with 78 rushing touchdowns, 668 yards receiving, and 5 receiving touchdowns. Over the past four years, Hankins has helped Parkland High School win three bi-district championships and an area round championship.

Deion's athleticism made him a stand-out on campus, but he is also known for his community service and leadership through the Fellowship of Christian Athletes and Youth For Christ. Deion was also at the top of his academic game in 2018, ranking in the top 10 of his class while taking Advanced Placement and dual-credit classes!

EASTWOOD HIGH SCHOOL UIL 5A STATE CHAMPIONS

2018 will be known for its record-breaking boys cross-country season at Eastwood High School! For the first time ever, the Troopers boys cross-country team decisively captured the gold and brought home the UIL 5A state championship! The team, which is under the direction of Coach Mike McLain, earned a total of 62 points to win their coveted gold medals, easily surpassing the second-place finisher by 25 points. The previous year, the Eastwood team won the bronze in the UIL Class 6A state cross-country meet. The Troopers boys cross-country team included Sergio Cuartas, Eddie Gallegos, Nathan Hernandez, Juan Olmos, Aaron Perez, Elias Perez, and Kayn Quinones.

LEADING THE WAY IN TEXAS EDUCATION

Superintendent Dr. Xavier De La Torre is not only leading Ysleta ISD and the El Paso area toward a new, innovative, and modern era of education, but will soon serve in a similar capacity statewide!

In February 2018, Dr. De La Torre was unanimously elected as the 2019 chair of the Texas Urban Council (TUC) of Superintendents, a network of the state's top school leaders that discusses governance, leadership, management, governmental relations, and other topics relevant to traditional urban public schools.

TUC members, which consist of school districts in large urban areas like Corpus Christi, Dallas, Austin, and Houston, represent nearly 800,000 students and 50,000 teachers. TUC members routinely serve larger percentages of children living in poverty who are less likely to have parents with high levels of education, and are constantly balancing different barriers.

De La Torre, who joined YISD in 2014, has a 30-year history of dedicated service to large, diverse student populations, and a career chronicled by recognized achievements and awards, including an El Pasoan of the Year nomination; two Broad Prize Award finalist nominations; and the Edgar L. Morphet Award for the nation's most outstanding dissertation aimed at the educational issues.

During his tenure at YISD, the district's most vulnerable student groups have seen increased achievement under the state of Texas' accountability system. In particular, English Language Learners and Special Education students have routinely outperformed their peers in the region and across the state.

Coupled with the introduction of El Paso's first all-girl college-preparatory academy; two new Early College High School programs; new STEM programs; and the passage of a \$430.5 million facilities bond, De La Torre has emerged as a regional authority in El Paso relative to the American public school system.

TEACHER AND SUPPORT EMPLOYEE OF THE YEAR

YISD employees are the driving force behind the district's success. Day in and day out, administrators, teachers, and support employees make a lasting impact in our schools and community with their expertise, knowledge, and willingness to do whatever it takes to help students achieve and succeed. This is why we honor the best of the best at our annual Teacher and Support Employee of the Year gala. Loma Terrace Elementary School teacher Carol Love and Riverside High School teacher Stephen Solis were named the 2018-19 Elementary and Secondary Teachers of the Year, respectively, while Sundra Strickland from Dolphin Terrace Elementary School was named Support Employee of the Year.

Love, a second-grade teacher has spent her entire 41-year career in education at Loma Terrace Elementary School! It was her fourth-grade teacher and high-school band director who moved her to pursue a career in education.

"It was evident that both of these teachers loved their profession," said Love, adding that she has maintained high expectations for her young students, whom she loves and values. "I want them to shine like little stars!"

Solis, a theater arts and computer science teacher and coach, grew up in Corpus Christi. When speaking about his decision to become a teacher, he recalled how his father took night classes and went from working as a middle-school janitor to becoming a P.E. teacher and coach.

"He never let anything stop him from pursuing his dream," Solis said. "I was inspired to make him proud and lead a life where I could make a difference in the lives of others, just like he did."

Strickland, a 32-year YISD employee, served as a P.E. paraprofessional aide at Dolphin Terrace Elementary School. This position afforded Strickland the opportunity to know every student and build relationships with them and their families.

Outside of her job duties, she says it is important for her to make herself available for school events, professional development, district initiatives, and parent conferences, even though she is not required to do so.

"My objective is to change the perception that history is boring by allowing students to experience engaging and real-life activities," said Perez, who earned praise statewide when she was named the 2018 Outstanding Seventh-Grade Texas History Teacher by one of the the oldest patriotic women's organization in Texas and the nation.

"I encourage my students to think like historians," Perez wrote in her winning application for the contest sponsored by The Daughters of the Republic of Texas (DRT). "As they uncover the advancements made in the United States, I encourage them to apply (this) to their personal lives by understanding that even through defeat, personal victories can be achieved."

To be considered for the award, candidates were asked to submit letters of recommendation; teaching philosophy and instructional method; curriculum vitae/résumé; innovations conceived and executed for seventh-graders; and the response of the students.

DRT officials said they chose Perez after learning how she uses creative ideas and manipulatives to enhance student interest in the early history of Texas. As the winner, Perez's school was awarded \$1,000, and she received a \$750 award and a special plaque at the 2018 DRT Convention in Dallas.

Founded in 1891, the DRT's mission is to perpetuate the memory and spirit of those who achieved and maintained the independence of Texas; and provide educational programs in coordination with school districts and the Texas Education Agency, among others.



Working Tirelessly for Student Health

School nurse administrators often labor tireless ly to improve working conditions for the campus nurses they oversee – they have learned to keep a pulse on district administration and the daily clinic routines at our campuses, according to the Texas School Nurses Organization (TSNO).

This is why TSNO turned to Ysleta ISD in 2018 to honor one of our best: YISD Student Health Services Director Carey Raymond-Holden, who won 2018 Regional School Nurse Administrator of the Year!

"Working late hours, often going unnoticed, (school nurse administrators) don't require anything they are not willing to do themselves," TSNO officials said. "As a leader, they are able to inspire others to give more."

As part of her award, Raymond-Holden received a special plaque and recognition during the TSNO annual conference in November in Dallas to cel ebrate her excellence in school nursing and her leadership in school health.



VOLUNTEER PROGRAM

Parents and community members are encouraged to participate in our Volunteer Program, which helps build strong partnerships between parents, teachers, administrators, and community members. We offer numerous ways for volunteers to help at our campuses, such as assisting in the volunteer room; monitoring the cafeteria or playground; and serving as mentors, tutors, and crossing guards, among others. We have an annual Recognition Awards Luncheon to thank all our district volunteers for all they do for our students, faculty and staff.

Parents in our district are encouraged to attend state, regional and district parental engagement conferences at no cost to them. In addition, parents are provided with enrichment community presentations at each of our campuses that cover topics like literacy, GED, and parenting skills.



Our Partners in Education (PIE) program is made up of about 700 businesses, military, nonprofit groups and individuals who provide funding and support for YISD schools. Our Partners contribute to the success of our schools by donating money or supplies, as well as mentoring students, providing internships, and offering incentives to reward students.

Every year, our generous Partners In Education make it possible for YISD to hold a Back to School Rally, where thousands of school-age children in grades K-12 receive free backpacks filled with school supplies to help prepare them for the new school year. Major PIE contributors in 2018 included El Paso Electric Company; the law firm of Delgado, Acosta, Spencer Linebarger & Perez; and the El Paso Chihuahuas.

Our Partners in Education always contribute significantly to the improvement our schools and Ysleta ISD. The 2018 "Power of One" award, which honors the most outstanding individual partner, was Dr. Christopher Kazanjian with Kidz 'n Coaches. Working with Ramona Elementary School, Dr. Kazanjian's program aims to help students grow through promoting relationships with peers and mentor coaches. Earning the 2018 "Spirit of Ysleta" award was Border Therapy Services, which has provided mentoring, clinical instructors, and internships for students in the Health Professions Magnet program at Bel Air High School.

Partnering for the **Future**

As part of its mission to enhance STEM instruction in schools in order to fill expected shortages of qualified workers in the future, YISD's valued PIE member Marathon Petroleum Corp. awarded more than \$167,000 in grants in 2018 to five YISD campuses!

The grants were used to purchase high-quality STEM equipment at all five campuses – Ascarate and Ramona elementary schools, Camino Real Middle School, and Del Valle and Riverside high schools – that included Lego Mindstorm robots; Sphero robots; 3D printers; laptop computers; and a laser-cutter, among others.

Camino Real Middle School teacher Yvette Garcia said the grant funding has already served as "a catalyst to improve just our basic STEM program. But as these kids get more excited about it, the teachers get more excited about it, and the program grows exponentially."





INVESTMENT

In keeping with the promises made to the community during the 2015 bond campaign, YISD continued to proceed smoothly in its mission to address aging campuses and school improvements and renovate/build new schools. More than 2,000 students welcomed the 2018-19 school year at two brand new, spacious, and modern facilities, featuring flexible design environments that pushed the boundaries of school architecture! By the end of the year, several of the bond's largest projects had been completed or were racing toward the finish line in all seven Learning Communities. YISD also maintained its longtime responsible financial stewardship, earning top ratings from the state and positive comments from auditors.

EDUCATIONREDESIGNED

In the shadow of YISD's centennial celebration in 2015, we asked voters to support our ambitious promise to transform The District into a beacon of 21st-century learning and innovation by 2020 through the passage of a \$430.5 million facilities bond.

Voters agreed – and within weeks, our work began in earnest to upgrade, renovate, expand, or construct modern schools and facilities in each of our seven Learning Communities.

Three years later, the YISD Bond 2015 Program was 85% under construction and more than half of the bond projects were completed, including new athletics and fine-arts facilities, technology and security upgrades, school renovations, and kitchen/cafeterias and gymnasiums.

Most impressively, however, was the grand opening of two new schools in some of the city's oldest neighborhoods: Thomas Manor Elementary and Bel Air Middle! Both are spacious, with flexible walls and furniture, open lounges for project collaboration, and modern classrooms equipped with smart technology.

In 2019, we will see the opening of a new K-8 combination school in the Del Valle community, as well as an extensively renovated Eastwood High School. In 2020, final bond projects scheduled for completion include the Ysleta High School Fine Arts Center and the Bel Air High School Sports Complex.

We promised ... and we have delivered under these four pillars of performance: To be on time, under budget, of superior quality, and – where possible – performed by local labor.

We want every school to be a modern learning environment and hub for the community, created with an eye toward the knowledge every student needs to prepare for the future in a rapidly changing economic and technological environment.

Revitalizing a 103-year-old landlocked district in fewer than five years hasn't been easy, but Ysleta ISD successfully paved the way with the support of its community, Board of Trustees, and its Vision 2020 Strategic Action Plan.

EASTWOOD HIGH SCHOOL


The renovation of Eastwood High School is the largest project of the 2015 bond program. The \$93 million project will reconstruct approximately 90 percent of the campus, and feature state-of-the-art technology spaces. More specifically, the renovation will include the construction of new two- and three-story wings to replace the oldest portions of campus that date back more than 50 years, plus new classrooms, upgraded athletic facilities, and fine arts wing.



Will house about 2,300 students in grades K-8 from the existing Camino Real and Valley View middle schools, and Mission Valley ES; and share core spaces like a kitchen, library, fine arts spaces, and STEM classes.


SUPERIOR ACHIEVEMENT

For the 14th year in a row, YISD earned a Superior Achievement designation – the highest rating available – on SchoolFIRST (Financial Integrity Rating System of Texas), the accountability system developed by the Texas Education Association (TEA). The 2018 rating is based on the district's annual audit of the 2016-17 financial information.
