





If you can do those two things, all while following the directions of your college application, you can be an impressive candidate for your school. And we're here for you every step of the way!



Personal Essay

There are many components that make up a college application and the essay is an important element. A college essay is a chance to tell your story in ways that your resume or test scores can't. This is an opportunity to really go deep. What's your story? What are you possionate about? How have your experiences shaped you into who you are today? Who do you want to become in college and beyond? An effective college essay will answer these questions and help the person reading it get to know you on a more personal level.

Every student's essay will be different - that's the point! Your essay should be unique to YOU. While there's no such thing as a "perfect" college essay, there are a few things you can do to make sure yours is as well-written, honest, and authentic as possible.



Choose a prompt that interests you.

Be sure to respond specifically to the prompts. Choose a prompt that will help you tell your story in the best and most effective way. No matter what prompt you choose, make sure you fully respond to the prompt in your essay. Here's a <u>list of common topics</u>.



Follow a 5-paragraph essay structure.

Make an <u>outline for your essay</u> and be sure to include an introduction that states the main topic or theme of your essay, three body paragraphs to explore and break down the topic or theme, and conclusion paragraph that summarizes what you just wrote about and shares your hopes for the future.



Have someone review your essay.

Before you submit your essay, be sure to have someone else proofread it for you. They can check spelling and grammar, give feedback on how well your essay answered the prompt, help you strengthen the main theme of your essay and more. We're here to help! 

Types of College Expenses

Direct Expenses

Money paid directly to the college

- Tuition & Fees: costs to attend a class plus fees such as lab fees,
 library fees, tutoring centers, etc.
- Room & Board: housing/dorms and meal plans

Indirect Expenses

Additional expenses associated with attending college

- Books & Supplies: required books and/or equipment, laptop, tablet, printer, etc.
- Travel & Miscellaneous Expenses: flight/bus tickets back home,
 gas/ toiletries


